FIRST THURSDAY: "About Hawaiian Words" 6:00 PM

Here's the fastest and easiest way to become acquainted with Hawaiian terms. It's not a series of classes to learn the language but a single introductory session that's complete in one sitting lasting an hour -- explaining the basics of Hawaiian word structure and spelling and pronunciation. FIRST FRIDAY: "Oases In Downtown Honolulu" 2:00 PM

Learn how to practice Chant Walking -- right in the hectic center of the city. A special route is followed through selected sites which together create an atmosphere ideal for gently enhancing physical fitness, calming the mind, deep breathing, natural body carriage, and psychological benefits of personal autosuggestion. Starts beside the fountain at Saint Andrew's Cathedral on Beretania Street.

FIRST SATURDAY: "Walk To Diamond Head Lighthouse" 2:00 PM

This highly informative tour originated in 1982 and now ranks as the Aloha State's oldest, regularly scheduled, all-volunteer Litter Control Project, during which accurate facts are given about the famous volcanic crater and its surroundings, while we stroll through the entire length of scenic and historic Kapi'olani Park and past The Gold Coast to the picturesque 55-foot tower (which we do not enter) on the Kuilei Cliffs. Meet the leader in front of the Mahatma Gandhi Statue near the entrance to Honolulu Zoo.

FIRST SUNDAY: "Barack Obama's Hawaiian Neighborhood" 2:00 PM

This fully narrated walk gives biographic details about the early development of President Obama, pointing out places in the everyday environment he experienced during most of his boyhood and all of his teen-age days. The outing presents a respectful retrospective honoring the individual who became this city's most renowned personage. It's a perfect activity for everyone sincerely interested in knowing more about the birthplace (exact building) and "Hawaiian years" of the man who has become our Nation's forty-fourth Commander In Chief. Starts on the tree-shaded grass alongside the traffic light at the northeast corner of Punahou and Beretania Streets.
